













Q5. You mentioned you are not fully committed to your firm choice decision. What would make you more committed? All who are not fully commited to firm choice: Total=126

## Missing out on the full experience (academically or socially) at university is top of mind for applicants

#### Concerns about starting university in the autumn

Having to learn online	43%
Missing out on the real university experience	42%
Not having a part-time job while I'm at university	29%
Not getting the mental health support that I need	21%
Being at a disadvantage academically	20%
Not having access to university facilities e.g. libraries, labs, materials etc.	20%
Not getting my first-choice accommodation	19%
Having to learn at home	18%
Not having a fresher's week	18%
Not having enough contact hours	13%
Not having a summer job before university	13%
Not having access to academic staff	10%
I'm not worried about anything	9%
Something else	6%

 Females are more concerned than males about having access to mental health support (23% vs 13%) and being at an academic disadvantage (23% vs 16%)



- BAME applicants are more concerned about not having had a summer job before starting uni in the Autumn (17% vs 10%)
- Applicants in Scotland are more worried about a lack of contact hours (27%)
- Those applying to high tariff universities are more worried about the overall academic experience, particularly having to learn online (43%), not getting their first choice accommodation (26%) and not having a freshers week (21%)



#### Four in five are confident that teacher assessed grades will be at least 20 July 2021 the same if not higher



## Around half of applicants say that they are aware of the appeals process




- No, I don't know the process






### University tier




