INTRODUCTION

The Who Cares? Trust has created *The H.E. Handbook for Care Leavers* to give young people who are in or leaving care information about the support that is available at higher education institutions, and further education institutions that offer higher education courses, in England and Scotland. We put this together by asking each institution to tell us what they offer.

This is the version for Scotland. It includes a revised finance section specifically for the Scottish system. There is a section that explains the support that you can get if you're a Scottish student looking to study in England, or an English student who wants to study in Scotland.

Over the next few pages we describe what the handbook contains, give you some information about student finance, a few useful links and a 'jargon buster' to help you (on page 33). The rest of handbook is made up of information from institutions. There is a page for each institution and they are organised alphabetically. If you have any questions about financial arrangements you should contact the institution.

The guide is designed for 16 to 25 year olds leaving care, but it contains useful information for carers and professionals working with young people in care and care leavers.

Studying a higher education course can be a big decision for any young person and we want to make sure that you have as much support and information as possible to make the decision a little easier.

We hope you find this handbook helpful. Good luck with finding the institution that is right for you.

Every higher education institution in The H.E. Handbook has its own page. Each page has the following information:

CONTACT DETAILS

This tells you who to get in touch with at the institution if you have questions about the support for care leavers. It gives you their name, job title, telephone number and email address. You will also find the address for the institution's website. If there isn't a specific named person for you to contact, there will still be a number for you to call if you have any questions.

BUTTLE UK QUALITY MARK

This is an accreditation scheme which is trying to increase the number of care leavers entering and staying in education post 16.

Quality Mark institutions are required to offer a range of support, including help with year round accommodation, bursaries and a designated member of staff as the key contact for students from a care background.



If an institution has the Quality Mark, you will see this logo in the top left corner of the page.

CHECKLIST OF SUPPORT

We worked with a group of young people, universities, colleges and leaving care teams to make a list of things that it is important for higher education institutions to offer to care leavers. We have grouped these under two headings: CHECKLIST OF SUPPORT and FUNDING.

On each page there are a series of ticks and crosses showing whether that institution offers each of the elements of support.



We recommend that you always contact the institution you are thinking of attending to check the latest support available and for any further information.

The checklist of support includes:

A DEDICATED WEBSITE FOR CARE LEAVERS

"Dedicated" means that you can find it through the university main website search engine or it can be reached directly from the home page. This should include detailed information about what they offer to care leavers and who to contact. All designed to make your life easier.

Some of the web addresses for these sites are quite long, so we've used Bitly to shorten them, which means they might look like this: http://bit.ly/1kiljUR. The links will still take you straight to the right website.

NAMED OFFICER FOR CARE LEAVERS

It can really help to have one person who you can go to with questions and to get support. Lots of institutions have a single person who is responsible for helping care leavers. If they tick this box then you know there is one person who you can go to for help with any problems.

OUTREACH SUPPORT OR ACTIVITIES

This describes the activities and support that an institution offers care leavers to encourage them to study there. This might include:

- Summer schools
- Campus tours
- Taster sessions
- **Compact schemes** (where you could receive an offer based on passing a short course run by the institution rather than prior academic achievement)

If you're thinking about studying next year then get in touch with the institution as outreach activities might be just the thing to help you make up your mind about where you want to study

PRE-APPLICATION HELP

Some institutions can offer you advice on which course is right for you and the different options that are available. They can give you ideas for your personal statement and help with filling in your UCAS form.

CONTACT OFFER HOLDERS

If they tick this box, institutions will contact you once you have been offered a place to tell you what support they can provide. This can help make the choice of which institution a little easier to make.

To make sure institutions can contact you it is really important to indicate on the UCAS form (using the tick box) that you are a care leaver. This information will only be shared with people that need to know, it won't be shared with other students.

365 DAYS ACCOMMODATION

Accommodation can be a real problem for care leavers thinking about higher education. Do you move away from your flat to study? What happens during vacations? Will you have to come back to your local authority during the summer?

Many institutions now offer accommodation to care leavers for 365 days a year. This can be in accommodation they own (like halls of residence) or help finding a private flat (this will often be shared).

If they ticked this box, institutions will offer you accommodation for the whole year (including the summer holidays).

It is worth noting that you might have to move to different accommodation during the holidays. This is something you should ask the institution about.

Further education institutions, such as colleges, which offer higher education courses can select N/A (not applicable) for this question. This is because not all of them offer accommodation to their students.

SUPPORT TO FIND 365 DAY ACCOMMODATION

If they have ticked no (or N/A) to the above they might still offer support to find vacation accommodation so you can stay in the same area. They will have ticked yes to this question if they do.

CAREERS AND POSTGRADUATE SUPPORT

Deciding to go to a higher education institution is a big step, but just round the corner you will need to think about the next stage of your life. Institutions can offer you help in making those choices. This could be through a careers office, through mentoring or by providing you with some publications.

ADDITIONAL FUNDING

By this we mean funding to help you with the cost of studying a higher education course, that is open to all, or a specific group of students. These could be hardship funds, which anyone can get support from.

SPECIFIC ADDITIONAL FUNDING

By this we mean funding that is only available for care leavers. You might not automatically get the funding specifically for being a care leaver though – you will probably still need to apply for it.

SUPPORT FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS AND THOSE WITH DISCRETIONARY LEAVE TO REMAIN IN THE UK

There are different ways that universities may offer support. It could be that they use their discretion to charge home fees instead of overseas fees, or they may have funding that only asylum seekers can apply for.

You may find specific details on what the institution offers in the free text funding box on each page. If there isn't any information and they have ticked YES in the checklist, then contact the institution directly to see what they offer

FINANCIAL ADVICE

Balancing your budget can be tricky, especially if you have lots of different sources of income. That is why some institutions offer financial advice to help you manage and to access all of the funding you are entitled to.

FUNDING

There is a free text box on each page where the institution can give further information about the funding support that they offer and that you may be able to access. Every institution has a different system in place for supporting care leavers.

You can find out more information about these funding streams and other student finance on the next few pages of the handbook.

Please remember that financial support is often dependent on students' individual circumstances and it is best to contact the institution directly to confirm the exact amount you may be able to receive.

FURTHER INFORMATION

Lots of institutions offer all kinds of support for care leavers (more than is included in the checklist). This might be a mentoring scheme, a lower grade offer for care leavers, a regular group of care leavers or a welcome pack when you first arrive. Institutions have a box on their page to tell you all about the other things they offer. It might not always be enough space to include it all, so do get in touch with them to see if there is more available.

Even though adding up the sums for university may seem scary, it is important to remember that the student finance system is there to help and you do not need to find any money upfront.

Instead, you will receive financial support in the form of loans, grants, bursaries, scholarships and fee waivers to pay for your course and living costs at university and will not have to pay back any money until you have finished your course and are earning over £16,365.

A different limit may apply if you move to live in a country outside the UK. If you drop out of your course early, you will still have to pay back your student loan and will probably have to pay back any bursaries or other loans that you have received.

The funding that is available is for the course you take, not the institution you go to, so you should still get the same support if you apply to a university or college. Sometimes studying full time or part time can make a difference to the amount of funding you can get.

Remember: You should contact your preferred institution for advice if you are unsure of your eligibility for funding.

The following paragraphs provide a summary of the financial support you could receive. You should contact the Student Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) to find out your own exact entitlement. SAAS has a dedicated contact centre on 0300 555 0505. Calls are charged at local rates. Alternatively, you can visit the website at www.saas.gov.uk or the SAAS Facebook page at www.facebook.com/saasfb.

DIFFERENT KINDS OF FUNDING

LOANS

You can receive a total support package of up to £7,250, which includes a student loan of up to £5,500. Many students are wary of loans because of fears of building up debt, though student loans are offered on terms that are better than commercial bank loans. The rate of interest is low and you do not have to pay the loan back until you are earning the threshold salary (currently £16,365 per year).

Because in most cases Scottish students attending college or university in Scotland don't pay tuition fees, the average debt for a student in Scotland at the end of their course is around one-third of that built up by students in England. SAAS cannot assess you for a loan if you are under 16.



Remember: All loans have to be repaid when you have finished your course, but only when you are earning a good salary.

BURSARIES FROM THE STUDENT AWARDS AGENCY FOR SCOTLAND

These are available for young students (under 25) and independent students (for example, if before the start of your course, you are 25, are married, in a civil partnership, or living with a partner, or if you have a child dependent on you).

Bursaries are separate from your loan and you do not have to pay them back. If you are a young student, you may be eligible for a bursary of up to £1,750. If you are an independent student you may be eligible for a bursary of up to £750. You should contact SAAS to find out if you are eligible for this additional financial support.

VACATION GRANT FOR CARE LEAVERS

SAAS provides a grant for students who have been looked after to cover the cost of accommodation in the summer holiday between each year of their course. SAAS will pay up to £105 a week directly to your landlord. For example, if you make arrangements to stay in a college or university residence during the summer vacation, this grant can be used towards meeting the cost. Remember: You do not have to repay a bursary or grant.

WHO DECIDES HOW MUCH MONEY I RECEIVE?

Loans and bursaries from SAAS are 'means tested', so the amount you will receive is based upon what is referred to as 'household income'. If you are leaving care you are likely to be eligible for the maximum amount of financial support available.

OTHER FINANCIAL SUPPORT AVAILABLE

Most higher education institutions will offer their own financial support in the form of a bursary or scholarship (see the funding box for each institution).

These will have their own eligibility criteria and are often only available to a limited number of qualifying students.



To make sure you can get access to financial support for care leavers, make sure you apply early and use the UCAS tick box to tell the institution you are a care leaver.

You may receive the money in cash or as a fee waiver where your course fees will be reduced for either a particular year of study or your entire course. Therefore, instead of receiving the cash in hand, the cost of your fees will be lower.



Remember: Bursaries and scholarships DO NOT have to be repaid.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FROM YOUR LOCAL AUTHORITY

As a care leaver you may be entitled to financial support from your local authority. The amount of support you can receive will depend on the length of time you were in care, the education you have undertaken before and which local authority provided your care.

You should get in touch with your local authority and ask them for a copy of their written policy for financial support for care leavers and ask them how they can support you.

PATHWAY PLANS

It's really important that if you want to go to university, it's written into your pathway plan. Pathway plans are agreements between you and the local authority about the support that they will give you and if it's not written into your plan, it's hard to make the local authority provide it.

Don't panic if your plan doesn't have university in, talk to your personal advisor about getting it put in and the support they can give you.

STUDYING IN ANOTHER COUNTRY IN THE UK

If you live in one country of the UK, you might still want to study in one of the other countries in the UK. If you do, there are some differences in how you apply for support, and what you are eligible for.

This shouldn't be a reason for you not to go for it, but you need to make sure that you understand what the differences are.

SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS WHO LIVE IN ENGLAND BUT WOULD LIKE TO STUDY IN THE REST OF THE UK

If you live in England but would like to study in Scotland, Northern Ireland or Wales you will still be able to apply to Student Finance England for help paying your tuition fees. You then may be able to access different additional support in different parts of the UK.

In England, there are Access to Learning Funds to help students who need help financially and they are administered through the institution. In other UK counters the names and criteria for these funds are different:

- In Scotland, these funds are called Discretionary Funds
- In Wales, they are Financial Contingency Funds
- In Northern Ireland, they are Support Funds

These are all administered by individual institutions, so it is important to check with them about the individual eligibility criteria they have.

SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS WHO LIVE IN THE REST OF THE UK BUT WANT TO STUDY IN ENGLAND

If you would like to study in England but don't currently live there then students from Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland will be able to get loans and support to pay tuition fees from:

- Wales Student Finance Wales
- Scotland Student Awards Agency Scotland
- Northern Ireland Student Finance NI

SUPPORT FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS

The support that asylum seekers can receive is subject to immigration status and universities may offer support through Article 26. The Article 26 model provides a tuition fee bursary, a small grant and personal support, but there are some eligibility criteria. Universities have to offer a bursary, and students usually have to apply.

Students should check that the university that they are applying to has an Article 26 bursary on offer and ask about the eligibility criteria specified by the university they are applying to. More information can be found at: www.hkf.org.uk/hkf-awards/article-26-awards-1.

Care leavers are entitled to to apply for an access bursary which is currently valued at £1,000 per year for each year of study. To date, all care leavers who have applied for an access bursary have been awarded one.

Further information

We advise all care leavers who are considering applying to the university to contact the admissions manager. We can offer advice on applying and also meet one to show you round the university and introduce you to support staff.

Our admissions policy provides flexibility in making offers to care leavers as a means of recognising the disadvantages that living in care can have on educational attainment. We also offer financial support through our access bursary provision, support with accommodation, and a point of contact within our student support and accommodation office as well as an academic member of staff, who is understanding of the issues that care leavers may face.







Confidential advice is provided on opportunities in education and we can help with applying through UCAS for a degree programme.

We can also arrange campus tours for young people and their carers to enable them to get a better idea of what the university offers.

There is also help with learning and study skills available to help prepare for degree level study through our effective learning team and student services offer a range of support from funding and advice to careers opportunities.



JARGON BUSTER

Admissions	Admissions is the process where you choose where you'd like to study and institutions decide who to offer a place to. There are usually teams of people at each institution to help you through the process. If you have any questions then you should always ask them by using the named contact listed on the institution's handbook page.			
Article 26	This is a specific project run by the Helena Kennedy Foundation. They provide support for asylum seekers at certain universities, you can find out more about the project at: www.hkf.org.uk/hkf-awards/article-26-awards-1.			
Bespoke	This means support or projects which are designed just for you.			
Campus	The place where university buildings are based. Sometimes this is an out of town space, but some places have campuses in town too.			
Clearing	This is the process of finding a university place if you didn't get the grades you expected (whether they were higher or lower). You can find out more about clearing at www.ucas.com/students/nextsteps/clearing/			
Collegiate	This simply means a university that is made up of several different colleges. Colleges are not just halls of residence; they also have a responsibility in running the university.			
Compact scheme	Compact schemes are arrangements between institutions, schools and colleges. They are schemes that aim to remove or break down barriers for particular groups of students.			
	For some schemes this means a promise that applications will be carefully and sympathetically considered, for others it means you could get a lower offer if you take part in some form of additional learning.			
	These schemes can be really helpful as they give people who have lots of potential, but do not have formal qualifications to match, a chance to get into higher education.			
Counselling	You might want someone to talk to or someone to help you deal with your problems. Institutions can offer a counselling service which offers you this support.			
Educational psychologists	Educational psychologists work with people to assess how you learn and if you have any problems. They then suggest a range of different approaches (different learning aids or ways of studying) to help you get the most out of your time in higher education.			
Emergency bridging loans	These are short term loans to help if you face an emergency which leaves you short of cash. These are just a short term measure that is designed to keep you afloat. You should not rely on these loans and you have to pay them back.			
Foyer	Foyers are places where young people live, a bit like a hostel, often while receiving support from support workers to help them get ready to live independently. You can usually stay there for nine months to a year.			
Halls of residence	These are buildings owned by institutions where students can live. They range from traditional blocks with long corridors of rooms and catering on site, to self-contained self-catering flats.			
Means-testing	This is a process which decides how much money you are entitled to from certain schemes. It usually involves asking details about your current income, bank balance and savings. Institutions use this to make sure that the people who have the least money receive the most help.			

JARGON BUSTER

Mentoring	Having someone who knows the ropes can be really helpful. Lots of institutions run mentoring programmes which link you up with someone who has experience of university (often someone in the second or third year) and sometimes they have care experience too. They can help you understand what is going on, offer advice or just be a friendly person to have a chat with.
Named contact	This is a person in the institution who is responsible for working with care leavers. See the introduction of the handbook for more information.
Open days	These are specific days when institutions throw open their doors to potential students. You can have a look around, get a feel for what a place is like, meet some tutors and students and ask lots of questions. With so many places offering higher education this can be a great way to find a place you feel comfortable in.
Outreach events	These are specific events designed to attract people to higher education who have not traditionally gone. With only 6% of care leavers going to higher education at 19 there are a lot of programmes designed specifically for you.
Private sector accommodation	This is the other place people will stay while studying in higher education. They are houses and flats owned by private landlords. Often universities have housing offices which register landlords and can help you find somewhere to live.
Scholarship	This is funding that is available to certain people, which you do not have to pay back. It can be to reward people with really excellent skills or to encourage people who do not usually go into higher education to attend.
Student Awards Agency Scotland (SAAS)	This is the agency that you apply to for financial support (loans and grants) to study a course of higher education in the UK.
Student shadowing	If you're not sure what studying in higher education would be like, then some places offer you the opportunity to spend time with a student. You can go round with them all day and see what a lecture or seminar is like, check out the library and bar and ask them about life in higher education.
Study skills workshop	If you haven't been in education for a while or you feel like you could do with some extra help, these workshops provide an opportunity to practice the skills you need in higher education. They might help with writing an essay, conducting research or putting together a bibliography. These are great opportunities to hone your skills.
Summer schools	Summer schools take place over the summer holidays and give you a chance to put in a bit of extra study in a higher education setting. This could be when you're still at school to get a taste of life in higher education or after you've finished college to top on your knowledge before you start in higher education.
Taught year	For some funding schemes money is only available for years when you are being taught at an institution – as opposed to a year abroad or on placement.
Transition support	Transition is the process of moving from one place to another, and while there is support out there, some universities may offer extra support during the first part of your time somewhere, to help you get settled in.
Tuition fee waivers	Some funding comes as cash, some comes as money off your accommodation and some of it comes as tuition fee waivers. This means that you will pay lower fees and have less to pay back when you finish your course.
