

Education in Scotland

- The Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is the national curriculum for all schools, from nursery to secondary school. It emphasizes interdisciplinary learning, skills development, and personal achievement.
- Primary School P1 P7 / Secondary School S1 S6 (No 6th form Colleges)
- . National 5 are equivalent to GCSE's and are usually sat in S4
- . Highers/ Advanced Highers are studied in place of A Levels and are sat in S5 and S6
- . Pupils may also take a Scottish Baccalaureate in Sciences, Languages, Expressive Arts, or Social Sciences and these consist of related Highers and Advanced Highers and an interdisciplinary project
- . College courses HNC/HND




Gaelic Language in Scotland/ Gàidhlig ann an Alba

- The Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005 was passed by the Scotlish Parliament with a view to securing the status of the Gaelic language as an official language of Scotland commanding equal respect to the English language.
- . Scotland's most recent census (2021) showed that from a population of 5.5 million just over 1%, only 60,000 people, can speak Scottish Gaelic. Most are located in the Western Isles, Highlands and Glasgow.
- . Gaelic Medium Education is available in 14 out of 32 local authorities with 60 primary and 29 secondary schools
- . You can also study Gaelic as a Modern Language from Primary School up to Advanced Higher level
- . There are university courses taught wholly in Gaelic available at UHI & you can study Gaelic medium Education (primary and secondary teacher training)




HE provision in Scotland

- . 19 Higher Education Institutions including 15 Universities, a College of Higher Education, an Art School, a Conservatoire and the Open University in Scotland
- Glasgow School of Art / Scotland's Rural College degrees awarded by others
- . 4 Ancient Universities oldest founded in 1413 / newest in 2011



Student Numbers

- . "Free Education" for Scottish Students What does this mean?
- . Commissioner for Fair Access Outcome Agreements: 2030 target 20% of students entering university to be from Scotland's 20% most deprived backgrounds



Student Finance in Scotland - Scottish Students

- Student Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) is Scotland's student funding agency:
 - Provide government money to Universities and colleges to pay tuition fees
 - Provide bursary and/or loans for living cost support
- Students can receive funding for HND followed by degree study and are allowed a +1 year for change of course/ repeat of year
- Scottish students studying elsewhere in the UK are entitled to a Tuition Fee Loan for the full cost

Student Finance in Scotland - Rest of UK Students

- . Tuition fees for students from the rest of the UK are £9535 per annum
- . Students apply to their own Funding body
 - Student Finance England
 - Student Finance NI
 - Student Finance Wales
- Students can apply for a full tuition fee loan to cover the cost
- . Students are entitled to the same living cost support as if they study elsewhere in the UK

Care Experience(d) - definitions

- In Scotland we define care experience as any time spent in care up to the age of 18. So we advise that applicants tick the UCAS box to be considered as a care-experienced student regardless of their current age
- Types of care experience that is considered:
 - Foster care living with foster carers, on a short-term or long-term basis
 - Kinship care living with extended family, neighbours or family friends (usually agreed with social work)
 - Residential care living in a residential care home with other Care Experienced people
 - Compulsory supervision order (looked after at home) staying at home with family, but with support from social services
 - Compulsory supervision order (looked after away from home) living outside of the family home, cared for by foster or kinship carers, prospective adopters, in residential care homes, residential schools or secure units

Care Leaver

- A young person aged 16-25 who has been 'looked after' at some point since they were 14 years old and have been in care on or after their 16th birthday
- The leaving care age in England is 18 years, although some young people choose to leave care aged 16 or 17
